

Port of Echuca

The aim of the Port Restoration is to re-create the Old Port of Echuca as it existed during the years of the river boat trade — from the 1860's to about 1900 — and, in doing so, to provide the visitor with an accurate picture of the role played by Echuca in a transport system which no longer exists.

The port is part of the town. It is unfenced and the area is very much as it was 100 years ago. In fact, it is known for its authenticity — the restoration of century old buildings in their original locations, fortunately left intact after the river trade had died away.

The main area of interest is the massive red gum wharf where the cargo steamer PEVENSEY (better known as PHILADELPHIA in "All Rivers Run") and the historic logging steamer ADELAIDE are moored. Work began on the wharf in 1865. However, it was continually extended until, finally, in 1884, it was five times its present length — nearly three quarters of a mile long. In 1944 a shortage of firewood forced the Victorian Railways to demolish more than three quarters of the wharf, leaving only a small section for the remaining boats to use.

This section has been restored and a replica of the original cargo shed has been built. The wharf and adjacent area is now stocked with cranes and railway rolling stock.

An exciting new highlight is the Paddlesteamer Gallery which features scenes and activities typical of a journey along the Murray and Darling rivers around 1885.

Visitors are asked to step into a gallery simulating the old Echuca Wharf and, in imagination, board the P.S. "Corring" ready to set off on a journey along the Murray and Darling rivers to Toorale Station below Bourke.

The gallery helps bring to life the experience of the river men who crewed the steamers.

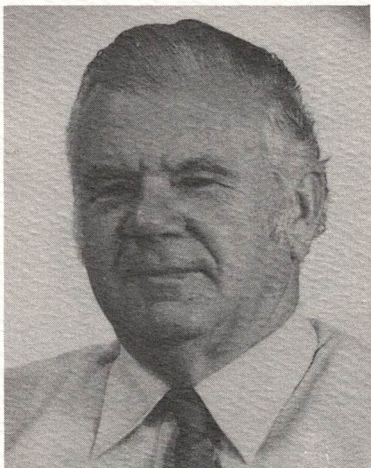
Crawford Lincoln became the seventh head of Old Sturbridge Village August 1, 1978. He came to the presidency of the nationally known history museum, largest of its kind in the Northeast, from a twenty year career in the publishing business. At the time of his appointment Mr. Lincoln, a native of Claremont, New Hampshire, was vice-president and secretary of the G. & C. Merriam Company, publishers of Merriam-Webster dictionaries, located in Springfield, Massachusetts. He is a graduate of Yale University, class of 1950, where he received a Bachelor's degree of arts degree. At Old Sturbridge Village he directs the staff of over 100 and is responsible for a museum which presents the life and structure of a typical New England and community of the period 1790 to 1830 for a variety of merchandising activities supporting the institution.

He is also a regional councillor of the American Association of Museums and the New England Museum Association; a director of the Massachusetts Cultural Alliance and the Central Massachusetts Cultural Care Foundation. He is a Trustee of American Antiquarian Society and has written articles on museum management for History News and Curator and has served as a panelist for the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Institute of Museum Services.

He serves as a corporator of the Springfield Institution for Saving Old Buildings, a member of the Advisory Board of Shawmut Worcester County Historical Society, director of Harrington Memorial Hospital of Southwick, Massachusetts; a member of the Trustees for the Episcopal Diocese of Western Massachusetts and past cochairman of its successful Vision 2000 Mission campaign.

He is a former member of the Massachusetts Foundation for the Study of the Humanities and Public Policy, the Massachusetts Council on the History and Humanities, and the boards of trustees of the Springfield Historical Society and Library and Museums Association and the Noah Webster Foundation of West Hartford Historical Society, Inc. He also served as chairman of the Longmeadow (Mass.) Bicentennial Commission.

With some shadows appearing on our economic situation it is essential that our organizations, of whatever size, or however funded, make certain that they are presenting an attraction that is seen by the public and tour promoters to be of good value. If a choice has to be made it is obvious that the best value for money will be selected.

It is therefore important to note that the underlying themes for a large part of this conference are directed towards two areas; firstly Management in various forms appropriate to our specific business and secondly, the importance of knowing more about our visitors.

I trust that the Conference will attract participants who also are concerned with these fundamental aspects.

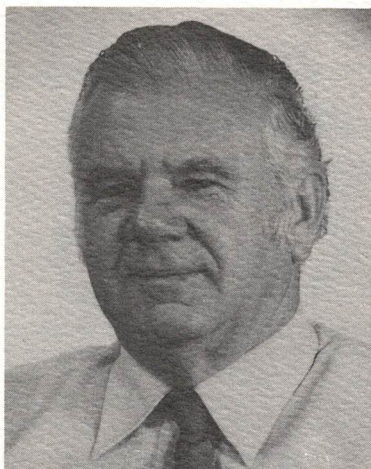
